#### THE BRIDGE IS AGAPE LOVE

"The differences that cannot be bridged by intellectual agreement offer an opportunity to learn a deeper dimension of agape love and enhance eternal rank. The schism in the Body produced by broken fellowship is far more damaging, and therefore is a greater sin than the supposed errors that keep the segments of the Body apart. Increased Agape LOVE is the remedy."

Agape love is the love which loves because of its own inherent nature, not because of the excellence or worth of its object. (W.E. Vine, Expository Dictionary of New Testament Words – Vol. 3 Page 20)

In his book, "Love Covers" Paul Billheimer states, "disunity in the Body of Christ is the scandal of the ages." He says that the greatest sin of the Church is not lying, stealing, drunkenness, adultery—not even murder—but the sin of **disunity**. Because disunity in the Body is more prevalent than those other sins and just as truly ties the hands of the Holy Spirit, it causes more souls to be lost than these flagrant offenses. The Holy Spirit cannot deal effectively in the conviction and conversion of sinners where the 'saints' are divided.

#### The First Step

What is the first step toward the healing of the wounds of Christ's Body? It may be the recognition and acknowledgement of the enormity and the heinousness of this sin. The next step is sincere repentance for our unloving attitudes toward one another, revealed by our critical judgment and broken fellowships. These are the 'wicked ways' among the Lord's people which require repentance. More than anything else, this disunity is preventing real revival and the Lord's return.

If spiritual leaders will lead the way in humbling, confession and repentance, the rank and file will follow. This is not a call to compromise sincere convictions. The most vital and tangible cornerstone and foundation of love—and therefore of unity and fellowship—is an ancestral or family relationship rather than a common opinion.

#### IN DEFENSE OF LOVE AND MARRIAGE

We appreciate the opportunity to share our passion to improve marriages in Calgary. We've been blessed with 48 years of marriage and as local advisors for the Marriage and Marriage Preparation Courses used around the globe. We enjoy encouraging churches to get involved and help train leaders. Other marriage courses are being used locally but could we do more?

A recent television news item showed churches collaborating to affect a dramatic turndown in divorce rates. In Clackamas County, Ore., 170 churches banded together in defense of love and marriage. Churches run courses, organize couple's date nights, and encourage older couples as marriage mentors. Could we collectively do the same? How can we raise awareness for Christian couples to have confidence to be transparent about their own difficulties, explaining how they surmounted them with God's love and help, and a few simple tools?

We methodically maintain cars, homes, and a host of things yet spend little time on relationships, resulting in marriage breakdowns with children as unwilling victims. Christian couples have not faired significantly better. This must bring great sadness to God. Most couples in their twenties avoid marriage even though statistics show stable and fulfilling relationships will not result. Can churches offer practical help to these and all couples? Our prayer is many will see the covenant of marriage worthwhile. Better equipped Christian couples can be better role models, able to come alongside family and friends in challenging times. Especially when unpredictable challenges happen - financial trouble, loss of a job or the grief of losing a loved one.

We hope those reading this article will be encouraged to help next time a marriage course is run at their church or perhaps run a course in their home. There is something very fulfilling about preparing for guests to arrive for a life changing experience. The little boy seemed to accept Belker's transition without any difficulty or confusion. We sat together for a while after Belker's death, wondering aloud about the sad fact that animal lives are shorter than human lives. Shane, who had been listening quietly, piped up, 'I know why. 'Startled, we all turned to him. What came out of his mouth next, stunned me. I'd never heard a more comforting explanation.

He said, 'People are born so that they can learn how to live a good life -- like loving everybody all the time and being nice, right?' The six-year-old continued, 'Well, dogs already know how to do that, so they don't have to stay as long...'

These are stuffs tragedies are made of. They may appear to be the rather innocuous, garden-variety human foibles, yet they are capable of destroying countless lives, families and church communities.

The ability to love ALL people, including those who hurt us and cause us troubles, can only come from individuals who have been transformed by God's unlimited and unconditional love. Love is not just one of the attributes of God; it is the essence of God's nature, because God is love (1 John 4:8). To participate in divine nature is to transform love from a state of feeling into a state of being.

Mother Teresa's life is an embodiment of compassionate love. In her book "A Simple Path" (1995, p.99) she says...'We must grow in love and to do this we must go on loving and loving and giving and giving until it hurts – the way Jesus did.'

In journeying down that simple path with Mother Teresa, we may be surprised by the discovery that love in all its purity can only be found in realizing our own brokenness and our need for healing. #### A Year in Review

"The Lord your God is with you, he is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you, He will quiet you with his love, he will rejoice over you with singing." Zephaniah 3:17

As I re-read my first Annual Report written three years ago, it began..."Would you like to take a walk as I follow Christ in His Great Adventure?" God has a habit of asking people to do things that are often fearful to them. There is always resistance. There is always a decision. There is always a changed life. Those who say yes to God's call don't walk the walk perfectly—but because they say yes to God, they learn and grow, even from their failures. They become part of His actions to redeem the world.

This month, Bridges of Love has completed its third year of operation. The past few years have certainly been an adventure and the road God has taken this ministry is certainly one that I could never have anticipated. The path has not always been clear and smooth but it has been a time of growth both spiritually and learning to navigate through this ministry. The learning curve has often been one where I have been stretched beyond my comfort zone taking us into unfamiliar waters but the words in Zephaniah 3:17 have given great comfort and carried us through.

Please let me share a little of the journey from the past year... (Complete report on Web-site)

After my return from Africa last July, I took some time to unfold what I had learned at the Vision Conference and all that I experienced from a culture that vastly changed my worldview. I knew that God had a reason for taking me on this trip so I wanted the memories and lessons learned to be captured. I spent a few months working on a week-workshop called "Living it Out"...Love is ACTION. It encapsulates so much of what God has taught me since I started Bridges of Love; drawing from my great appetite for reading good books to the life experiences since being a follower of Christ. Topics covered in this document are 'Love', 'Compassion', the 'Biblical Worldview', the 'Mystery of Community', 'Is Church a Relevant Institution?', and ends with 'Christians in Times of Pandemic/Disaster.'

The main focus of this ministry for the past few years has been on mobilizing the church community to be prepared in the event of an Influenza Pandemic. The most ambitious initiative undertaken was to plan and implement a National Community Summit on Pandemic Preparedness and Response. This event took place in Winnipeg this past June and was a collaboration between the International Centre of Infectious Diseases and the Canadian Mennonite University. From the positive feed-back received, we feel the goals were achieved. There is now much work to keep the momentum going in a forward direction.

Another activity which was undertaken was the application for Bridges of Love's Charitable Status. I am very pleased to report that as of August 1st, 2007 we are now a **Charitable Society** of a Religious Order. Our goals have been revisited since application three years ago for Society Status. The objectives suggested by the CRA which thankfully fit with our vision have been registered with the Alberta Registry and read as follows:

- To educate and instruct religious leaders and their parishioners on emergency preparedness and the church's role in pandemic situations.
- To preach and advance the teachings of the Christian faith and the religious tenets, doctrines, observances and culture associated with that faith.

As I reflect over the past three years, I thank the Lord for the open doors and opportunities to serve Him. I have grown to trust Him one day at a time as I see Him working through this ministry for His Glory. I know only by His Authority and Power can we accomplish the tasks for which He has called Bridges of Love.

Thank you to so many who have prayed, encouraged and just been a valued friend. I know that this is only the beginning of a great adventure as we serve God together. Even though the road is often hard and full of "bumps", I would not have missed this time of growth and maturing in my faith. Please stay tuned as God's plans unfold...

#### "WALK FOR WATER"

How far do you have to walk to get clean fresh water? Ten steps...? How about 2 km one way? What if the water is not clean? Do you walk another 5 km or in desperation and fatigue collect the dirty water just happy to have some drinking water for your family?

It is traditionally the women and children who fetch the water for the family. The supply of clean water is a great problem in much of Africa and in other developing countries.

St. Andrews Guelph Presbyterian Church decided to take action to help alleviate this plight with an initiative called "Walk for Water". Women were asked to collect pledges for an evening walk-anthon, to simulate what females do on a daily basis in Sudan.

Not only did the congregation members donate but neighbours, businesses and even a taxi driver gave to the cause. After driving a lady to the church and hearing why she was traveling at such an hour he donated the taxi fare and gave an extra \$10.00. What a blessing!

The walk started at 7:00 PM and carried on throughout the night ending with a church breakfast in the morning.

Individuals walked throughout the night, some for an hour and others bringing tents, lawn chairs and sleeping bags. There was special fellowship as we visited and cheered on the walkers.

Our goal to raise \$5000, the amount the Presbyterian World Service quoted for one well in Sudan, was surpassed. \$10,000 was pledged; enough for TWO WELLS!! The spirit of our church family was great and even though we had sore muscles, the smiles on everyone's faces said it all. We were indeed blessed, feeling God's pleasure by our Mission initiative – "Walk for Water".

# The Order of the Red Blanket By Lt. Col Irene Stickland

Three years ago I was traveling at Christmas, by bus, returning from a visit with my family. They had given me a warm red travel blanket as a gift-so needed on that stormy, snowy 16 hour overnight journey. During the night we were delayed in a bus station partway across the county and needing to change buses. Cold and tired as I was, I looked up to see an older woman pass by - with two plastic bags around her feet, held by elastic bands. Some inner voice nudged me out of my own discomfort and said, "They lady needs help!" I ran after her and learned she had frostbite, her shoes would not go over her wounds, she was poorly clothed. she was mentally challenged and could not find the bus to take her to her relatives. With only 10 minutes to my bus time, I found her bus, took her there, pulled off my boots and pulled my warm socks over her plastic bags. I gave her my coat, my lunch and the money I had in my pocket, and then took my new red blanket and wrapped her snugly in the front seat of the bus, just as the door was closing and her bus was leaving. She looked up and smiled, and said, "God has sent an angel".

The reason I tell you this story is that I have learned that I need to be alert and aware and sensitive to human need. And we also need to be prepared. A Christian should always have a red blanket to give to those in need. The red blanket can represent our plans and preparations for pandemic, the training and education we need in order to meet the needs of people along the way, the resources we have as individuals or as faith groups, or simply, a warm blanket in the car, so that in time of need, we have a practical and basic means of helping someone or saving a life.



# "But Seek First the Kingdom of God"...Matt. 6:33

"But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Matthew 6:33-7:13-14

Jesus gave His mandate throughout scripture for living a life pleasing to Him. We are to first LOVE God and seek His Kingdom and everything else will fall into line. We are instructed to not worry about our life (Matt. 6:25). This, however, is one of the most difficult disciplines of the Christian life yet so very critical for following in His Steps.

Once we have our priorities in order, it will not be difficult to keep our eyes on the Saviour and step out to serve others with His Love. There are many opportunities to serve in Calgary such as the Mustard Seed, NeighbourLink, Inn from the Cold, the Salvation Army and many others. We often give sacrificially without much thought to our own comfort or safety. Are we willing to love our neighbour enough to take care of someone who is sick, perhaps dying and very contagious? Do we love God enough to take that risk?

H<sup>5</sup>N<sup>1</sup>, the new killer strain of avian influenza spreading out of Asia, has only killed 153 people since 2003. Why then is there so much concern about bird flu? This Avian virus has happened before in the Spanish Flu of 1918 and it became the deadliest plague in human history, killing up to 100 million people around the world. This virus killed more people in 25 weeks than AIDS has killed in 25 years—yet in 1918 the case mortality rate was less than 5%. H<sup>5</sup>N<sup>1</sup>, on the other hand, has officially killed half of its human victims.

An Influenza Pandemic is a frightening thing and a legitimate human reaction to threat is **fear**. As Christians, we know that we are not to be ruled by fear so the best way to overcome this reaction is to trust God with our lives. Then, become knowledgeable on this subject and make decisions based upon this knowledge. There are facts that no one will be able to change but there is information available that you can act upon now to increase your feeling of security. The prospect of an influenza pandemic presents a unique opportunity for the Christian community to stand-up for God as we step out with His Power demonstrating His LOVE.

# A SIMULATION... PANDEMIC PREPAREDNESS "A Real-life" Exercise

Pastor Arnie at St. John Lutheran Church is preparing his congregation with a church response for an Influenza Pandemic. Simulating an actual outbreak in his church, helped the congregation see that there were major gaps in being really prepared for such a catastrophic disaster.

Some questions that arose after this exercise where a congregation member came in contact with an infected person at the Calgary Airport who had the deadly strain of an Influenza virus and she too was now showing symptoms.

- Who is our 'point' person for an Emergency Church response?
- Do we have a team of responsible individuals who are prepared with a pandemic strategy in place?
- Do we have proper communication and data bases set up for our community?
- Do we have adequate food on site if the church should suddenly be quarantined?
- Do we shut down all operations and activities as a church?
- What is our responsibility to the members/community around us?
- Do we have masks, sanitizer and other protective clothing?
- Do we have a contact name for our municipal health authority to receive instructions?
- Do we know individuals in the church who have medical training in specific areas?
- Do we have individuals trained in elementary nursing?
- Do we know our community intimately to know those neighbours who are going to need an extra hand if the case of an emergency situation.

This exercise was taken very seriously by the congregation. A Pandemic simulation is a very effective tool. Please call for more details. 263.5683

#### "WAVES OF BLESSINGS"

90 Days of Blessings (GDOP), Celebration 2007 (EFC) and Bridges of Love are joining arms to exhibit 'Waves of Blessings' throughout out city.

Bridges of Love's focus for this initiative is to raise awareness and then facilitate action for a church response to an Influenza pandemic.

The World Health Authority has stated that even though the timing of a Pandemic cannot be predicted there is little doubt that one is anticipated.

There is historic precedent that during times of epidemics in Roman Empire times, the Christian response made a significant contribution to the apparent "miraculous" growth of the church.

In his book, 'The Rise of Christianity' Rodney Stark, a sociologist, contributes this growth to the *practiced* belief of Roman Christians. Their hope—and the real life evidence that this was no "wish theology" – was compelling and attractive to 'those without hope.'

Also, Christians had a moral obligation to love others and they could not please God until they loved one another. This belief was certainly alien to pagans who did not provide sacrificial care and only looked after themselves.

This summer, Calgary Churches have an opportunity to learn how the local church can respond to an emergency that has the potential to bring widespread illness, death and economic disruption.

## Love is Spontaneous - 1 Cor. 13:4

Love suffers long and is kind...1 Cor. 13:4

Love is not premeditated—it is spontaneous; that is, it bursts forth in extraordinary ways, there is nothing of precise certainty in Paul's description of We cannot predetermine our thoughts and actions by saying: Now I will never think any evil thoughts, and I will believe everything that Jesus would have me to believe." No. the characteristic of love is spontaneity. We don't deliberately set the statements of Jesus before us as our standard, but when His Spirit is having His way with us, we live according to His standard without even realizing it. And when we look back, we are amazed at how unconcerned we have been over our emotions, which is the very evidence that real spontaneous love was there. The nature of everything involved in the life of God in us is only discerned when we have been through it and it is in our past.

The fountains from which love flows are in God, not in us. It is absurd to think that the love of God is naturally in our hearts, as a result of our own nature. His love is there only because it "has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit..." Romans 5:5

If we try to prove to God how much we love Him, it is a sure sign that we really don't love Him. The evidence of our love for Him is the absolute spontaneity of our love, which flows naturally from His nature within us. And when we look back, we will not be able to determine why we did certain things, but we can know that we did them according to the spontaneous nature of His love in us. The life of God exhibits itself in this spontaneous way because the fountains of His love are in the Holy Spirit.

# AMAZING GRACE IN THE LIFE OF WILLIAM WILBERFORCE

#### JOHN PIPER

Against great obstacles William Wilberforce, an evangelical member of Parliament, fought for the abolition of the African slave trade and against slavery itself until they were both illegal in the British empire. The battle consumed almost forty-six years of his life. The defeats and setback along the way would have caused the ordinary politician to embrace a more popular cause.

What were the roots of this man's endurance in the cause of public righteousness?

John Piper, in his recent book "Amazing Grace in the life of William Wilberforce", says what made Wilberforce tick was a profound biblical allegiance to what he called the "peculiar doctrines" of Christianity. These, he said, give rise in turn to true "affections" for spiritual things, which then break the power of pride and greed and fear and lead to transformed morals, which lead to the political welfare of the nation. No true Christian endure can unrighteousness unless his heart is aflame with new spiritual affections, or passions, "Mere knowledge is confessedly too weak. The affections alone remain to supply the deficiency."

Wilberforce says this is the key to public and political morality. "If...a principle of true Religion (the Spirit-given new affections) should...gain ground, there is no estimating the effects on public morals, and the consequent influence on our political welfare."

Wilberforce was a great doer...as stated by one of his biographers...'He lacked time for half the good works in his mind.' He lived to do good—or as Jesus said, to let his light shine before men that they might see his good deeds and give glory to his Father in heaven. (Matt. 5:16)

"The breadth of his heart and the diversity of his action beckon us all the more to ponder the source of his constancy."

I must say, it was a challenge putting the character trait 'humility' into words that a four year old could understand...

I don't know who wanted to see Charlotte's Web more...Hannah or Nana, but we decided that it might be helpful to understand why Wilbur was humble by seeing him in action. This little movie was packed with lessons on sacrificial giving, caring for others, showing humility, building loving relationships and showing what it means to just be a friend. I humbly say...we all shed a few tears!!

# FUNCTIONAL DEFINITION OF HUMILITY

# Humility is accepting our selves as we really are before God.

Humility is a person's recognition of his dependence on God, of his absolute need for submitting himself to God, which is the only remedy for pride. Humility is true self-knowledge --regarding oneself as God sees him. It is truth in self-understanding and truth in action. The humble person does not trust in his own strength, but in the power and love of God. True humility is a servant-like quality which enables one to place his life at the service of God and others.

True humility involves the readiness to place oneself at the disposal of others, to serve with God's LOVE.

So how does having a humble spirit work in today's society? Is the desire for success, power, and competition, clouding our ability to be truly 'humble'?

Christian humility is paradoxical. Christ has promised: "The greatest among you will be your servant. For whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted" (Matthew 23:11-12). James reinforces this point: "Humble yourselves in the presence of the Lord and He will exalt you" (James 4:10).

If we truly follow Christ's example, then humility will be a way of life, a habit of submitting to God's will and a lifelong commitment of devoting ourselves to God's calling. In daily practice, humility means to put aside self-interests in order to serve God and others whole-heartedly. Such an attitude would allow no room for a private agenda as we are set apart for God's purposes.

As long as we firmly believe that winning is the only thing that matters, it is not possible to develop humility. However, once we realize the enormous benefits of humility on both personal and societal levels, we will experience all other virtues and blessings, including God's commendation for eternity, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

K. Neill Foster, in his book "Revolution of Love" says "Revival", the revolution of love, comes only to those who will love God enough to humble themselves before others. The launching pad for revival was, surprisingly enough, not prayer but humility and transparent honesty among Christians.

"If my people, which are called by my name, shall <u>humble</u> themselves, and pray, and seek my face..."
